Rose recalled a day when a pregnant guest staying at St. Mary's came across a jar of pickles with only one remaining.

"Oh no!," I said, somewhat aghast, "Did she take your last pickle?" She calmly told me, "No." "Did you GIVE her your last pickle?" I asked incredulously. Rose flashed a bright smile and said, "I shared it with her."

I recognize that pregnant women having pickle cravings is cliché, but hunger for certain foods during pregnancy is real; growing a small human is no small undertaking. Rose shared her pickle! Her gesture was the epitome of kindness. When the reality of this simple story dawned on me I was struck with the richness of what it means to share life together and abide in community – where friends become like family. I told Rose she should be the poster child for friendship among pregnant ladies! Her humble smile told me that she thought nothing of it and would gladly share again.

God intricately and deliberately weaves the tapestry of our lives and blesses us with personal encounters with specific individuals. Perhaps the pregnant guest needed a loving gesture of generosity to fill a need in her heart that day. God is love and we bless one another when we choose to show Christ's love to others through kind deeds. These positive interactions multiply, build trust and enhance relationships. This is the desired atmosphere at SMHM.

Each woman at St. Mary's Home for Mothers articulated in her own way just what it means to live there. Moving in is like a reset and provides moms with resources to help their families grow stronger. "I'm going to raise my baby girl differently than the way I was raised," one mom shared. She commented on how much peace she feels living in a stable environment free of toxicity. Another mom said with sincerity and enthusiasm, "I love everything about this place!"

Here is a snapshot of a day at SMHM. A volunteer promised to pray for a mom regarding an imminent struggle she faces. The ladies have a great time gathering together for movie nights, but practical conversations about the chores chart occur too. A sleepy-eyed mother with a swaddled babe in arms entered the dining room for lunch and an offer was immediately made to hold her baby while she ate. Hope, prayers, work, fun, help – all of these elements are found at St. Mary's Home for Mothers.

The babies at SMHM are surrounded by love and add great joy simply by means of their existence. Bottles and blankets, binkies and burp cloths are in use. Babies get diapered and swaddled and rocked and burped. Sometimes they fuss and cry, as babies do. Faced with daunting obstacles, their mothers chose life in a culture that often snaps to the conclusion that babies are an obstacle to a woman's happiness or upward mobility. However, the truth is that each baby is a blessed gift to the world and possesses unknown potential. Together we are showing women going through unplanned pregnancies that they are capable and courageous. We believe in them. We will wrap them and their babes in loving arms. I see my ability to organize our donations and volunteers as a gift that lets us efficiently serve the most people possible. Tell us about a recent volunteer project at SMHM.

Karen Schmidt from the Respect Life Ministry at St. Charles Borromeo came out one day to drop off donations. This was my first time meeting Karen, although her Respect Life Ministry had already become strong advocates for SMHM. She asked what we needed and I told her that it was getting difficult to keep track of donations and properly distribute them without a proper shelving system. I showed her an area in the basement and she took it from there and connected me with those able to assist. John Hiatt listened carefully to our needs about the ideal setup and then designed exactly what I wanted. The next thing I knew, he and John St. Clair with the Knights of Columbus at St. Charles Borromeo made plans to build 60 linear feet of shelving.

Bill Tott, a Project Manager at Lowe's worked with us to provide materials specified by John Hiatt's design at cost. Lowe's cut the plywood and boards to specifications and delivered the products to SMHM. A crew of 5 built 14 individual shelving units that connected to make one huge unit in one day! The units are 6 feet tall and 32-48" deep. Special thanks to: Knights of Columbus #3414 - John Hiatt, Bob Keefe, Bob Borusheski, Dave Catron and former St. Pius High School and current University of Missouri student - David Deters. The cost of the supplies was paid for by the Respect Life Ministry at St. Charles Borromeo and the sweat equity of the volunteers. It was an amazing project!
